In spare time, I am reading more about evolution and natural selection, and improving my very weak biological background.

I gave the article on bacterial mutations to Rhoades for Genetics. McClung has a copy of it, and if you have time to take a look at it I shall be very pleased to know of your criticisms.

I hope it is not as hot in Bloomington as it is here. Princeton weather is very damp, but the town is beautiful, and near the great city.
