



**S**INCE I have been in the use of your Patent Metallic Points, which is about four months, I have by way of experiment, made use of them in cases of pains and inflammations of almost every kind, and in subjects of all ages and descriptions, and as might be expected, with various success. One fact however, I am fully convinced of, (in opposition to former prejudices) viz. That in a variety of circumstances a proper application of them is capable of operating a change in the human frame, which I can no more doubt, because I cannot assign a satisfactory philosophical reason therefor, than I can doubt the operation of opium, because the properties of that gum by which, and the modus operandi in which it produces sleep are to me wholly unknown. I am confident reasoning a priori would as soon establish one fact as the other. Cases in which the Points have in my practice appeared successful, are such as burns, headaches, agues in the face, ophthalmics, pains in the limbs, breast and sides, and in cynanche tonsillaris,

I could not learn that any means had been used for his relief, except keeping within doors and making some external applications. I applied the Metallic Point externally in the usual way; very soon the spitting sensibly decreased. After some time he observed the pain was wholly gone on one side, and much lessened on the other. I then directed him to make trial how he could swallow; he took a tumbler of sweetened water, and drank it with little difficulty, and immediately ate about half a point of custard. I then left him with directions to repeat the operation occasionally; and in the intervals to keep the throat covered with some emollient poultice. On visiting him the next day, I found him sitting at the fire roasting oysters, and eating them without difficulty; he observed he was well. I made every enquiry to discover whether the swelling had not burst, but could not learn any thing from him, which gave the least reason to think it had. I left him a dose of purgative pills, which he swallowed without pain and in a few days regained his usual health.

One case of a pain in the side, occasioned by the

patient, while unwell, being exposed to a cold damp atmosphere, attended with great interruption of locomotion and difficult respiration, was completely relieved by a few minutes application of the Points.

THE following history of cases are among the number of which I have to inform you, were treated solely by the practice of your Metallic Points.

CASE I.

A boy eight years of age, being a convalescent from a billious remitting fever, was attacked with a severe phlegmonic inflammation in one of his legs. On the sixth day of its swelling I was called in for advice; considerable fluctuation had made its appearance a-

about his ankle, and the whole leg was so tumefied that he could neither bear it to the floor nor lay it with ease on a pillow or in a bed. CASE II. A young woman aged 19 had a spontaneous phlegmonic inflammation on the upper side of the foot, attended with great pain and tumefaction.— On the ninth and tenth days, the Instruments were used, previous to which nothing had been applied. The pain immediately mitigated, the swelling subsided considerably, and in the night following imperceptibly burst. The instruments were continued; the wound discharged but very little, and in forty eight hours from the time it burst, she walked in perfect ease, and the foot was well in four days.

CASE III. My little child was scalded with very hot tea, on the forehead, about three and an half inches in length, and three fourths of an inch in breadth, which raised a visicle before I had time to get any thing to apply to it. The Metallic Points were solely used, and by three operations the whole redness disappeared; the blister broke, and the liquor under it, formed itself into a scabby surface. The next day the wound was perfectly circumscribed to the part blistered, and in three days the whole cast off and left the second skin perfectly entire, without the smallest appearance of suppuration or inflammation, and what is extraordinary, it never appeared to give the child the smallest pain, itching or smarting, and in appearance was so unlike a burn, that many enquiries were made what it was that grew on the child's head.

CASE IV. A lady fell from her horse, and dislocated her ankle, which remained several hours before it was reduced, by which it became very much swelled, inflamed and painful. Two or three operations with the Metallics relieved the pain, and in a day or two she walked the house, and had no futher, complaint.

I have used the Metallics in many other instances, wherein they appeared to have very salutary effects, but as the use of them were accompanied with other remedies and applications, I forbear mentioning them in this place. *I am, &c.*
