## Whe President <br> The White House Washington. D. C. <br> Dear Mr. President.

The House Appropriations Subcomattee on Health, Education and Welfare has just finished recelving cestimony from the Netional Institutes of Realth on the proposed Administration recomendations for Eiscal 1967.

I sincerely believe that I an conveying to you the general reaction of Subcomittee members of both parties when I state that the erperience was a most depressing one as we listened to one Institute Director after another outline erciting goals promising reductions in human disability and suftering which cannot be achieved under the very tight Eiscal 1967 budget.

We do not contend that the professional judgment budgets of the various Institutes are sacrosanct - they asked for apo proximately $\$ 337$ million over the amount which was finally recomended for their activittes. However, we were impressed with the fact that theme professional judgments were solidly predicated upon their knowledge as doctors of what it would take in the coming year to tura the tide against many of the major cripplers and killezs of our time.

As you well know, heat disease is the number one enemy of the American people, claming almost a million lives a year and also removing from our productive economy thousands upon thousands of our citizens who then becone, through no fault of their own, tax-eaters rather than tarapayers.

In signing the landmark Heart Disease, Cancer and Stroke legislation of 1965, which would not have come into Fruition without your magnificent supposts you renarked that the goal of this legislation was simple: "to speed the miracles of medical research from the laboratory to the bedside, "

The proposed tiscal 1967 bucget for the Mational Reart anstitute does not provice for many miracles. mactua sact. in the coming year the matitute wint De able to support less research grants than it did in Eiscal 1966. or even in fiscal 1965. Wurthemore it will not be anle to pursue several exctitngg research leads which hola onomous promise in reducing the toll of our number one killes.

Yor ermple, in Escel 1065 the Meart rastitute presented to us a carefully worked weverwyear protocol to test a number of drugs which show a great potential in reducing cholesterol levels and chereby preventing gecond and thire atteck among heart victing. We provided the mories sot thes program in Eoth fiscal 1965 and inscal 1966, but the program is now expanding to the point where an extra 32 milion in needed in the coming year to move this challenging work zomard at its projected level. This increase is not contained in the Acministration budget.

You are undowbediy Eaniliax with the increasing optimism anong such distingushed research investigators as Dr. Michael E. DeBakey of Baylor Univeretty and many of his colleagues. that we can avelop a totally implantable artificial heart within the next Eive years. Eowever, we have received testimony of the past two or three years that this will be a very expensive endeavor involving sophisticatea angineexing talents, contracts for exa persive hardvare, etc. mhe Natimat Eeart institute requested an aditional $\$ 15 \mathrm{million}$ in the coning year to get this program off the ground; this request was denied.
me budget for the National cancer Institute is even tighter. The actual amount of the increase over the cumrent year is only $\$ 251,000$ since research costs go up at a rate of about five percent annullyo this somenlled "increase" is actually a shayp cut. As the testimony brought out, the number of research awards which go to investigators in all parts of the country will be fax below the namber awarded in siscal 1966. It will be obviously impossinle for the tetional cancer Institute to tund even the becklog of pctentiflcallyaucoroved research grants which were awarded, but could not be paid, beceuse of insufficient funds last year.

The congress has been Eollowing with considerable interest the development of scientific task forces zeroing in on the major forms of cancer. whe prototype task force - on viruses and
and leukema - was started in tiscal 1065. In its report to the congress in fiscal 1966, the comittee on Appogriations redomended a task force on breast cancer. the leading kinier of woren. Bee couse of incuificient fumaty this task force could not be ace tivated. Whe request of the cancer mastitute Director for one million doluara to get it going in fiscel 1967 has also been denied.
cancer is a ruthess, wowlimwida killer of people, Zast year, it cut down 300,000 Americaas, many of them young childzen. young mothers, fathers in thetr $20^{\circ}$ and $50^{\circ}$ s. etc.

A recent national poll disclosed the fact that it was the cisease nost seaved by peope in all wank of hife, vice president mumprey recentiy pointed out that it mariean meientints dem veloped a cure for cmoer we would win thectemal gratitude of suFrexing people in all gares of tho world.

But we canot make any progress againat this monstrove killer when we are faced with a buaget for the coming year which cuts the funding for tesearch and training programe in cancex below that of the current year.

The American Medical Association has described mental inness as "Anerica's most pressing and comples health probiem." 2ts victims fill more than $50 \%$ of our horpital beds last year. it cost our economy more than bownion. of those rejected by Selective service for induction into our Amed forces, more then halt are tumed down because of mental disturbance or mental defect.

The sadening thing is that we have a considerable amount of research knowledge which cen cut down these mangower and economic Losses, but we still lack the trained personel to bring this precions knowleage to paople. the mational matitute of Nental mealth requested an increase of $\$ 15$ million in its training prograns so thet it could continue its efforts to bupply desperately needed ppychiatimes and other skilled personnei for state hospitals, mental health cinics, new comunity mental health centers, and so on, rowever, the Adminstration budget proviles only about $20 \%$ of this requested increase, with the zenult that 2,000 yourg men and young wonen fully qualified to pursue careers in paychiatzy peychology. social work and psychiatric nursing will receive notices this coming year telling them we canot use them

They are ready and eager, we need them, but we will not supply the funds to train thena.

We canot mount a mojow research offenstve against the big khiers unless we heve he haghly mophisthcated leboratomea end oher fachities to howse invectigetive work. since 2956, we have been building there facilities at a very slom pace. Tri 1965. on your recomendation, the concress aceplezated this program by authorising $\$ 280$ mition ovex the next three years to catch up with the backlog of applicetions troa medtcal schools. hospitaiz and private researeh laboratories in every part of this Inad. Fowever, the administration budget for tiscal 1967 provides on ip gly milion for these facilitios m the lowest mount in the Iest ten years, and $\$ 35$ minlion under the current yearts level.

In Enscal 1066, because of Eneutinctent Euns. the
 arosoved backlog over bo the coming yeat. on top of this. it is conservatively estinatea that another 60 million in reaeareh facility applicetions winh be approved in fiscal 1967. As a sesult, the National Inctitutea of Eealth will have tis mivion whth which to meet an doligatron of 8130 mLlion in caretulily screened applicationer ${ }^{\circ}$ new research Eacitities. This sharp cut will fall with parelealas harchness upon the 10 or 12 new medical schools which are strugging to open their doore. A research Eacility is an bosolute necessity in the medicel education of today. so the cut in Eacility funds win delay the opening of many of these schocls.

Mr. President in 1964 you appoinced the commission on Reart Disease, Cancez and strolse Reporting to you in Decenber of the same yean, it pointed out that twownimas of all Americans now living will fursen or die from one of these three diseases unlesa we do sonething about it. Your Comission also noted the ctaggeving economic costo of this death and disease on an ege timated $\$ 45$ binlion mat year alone.

Cpon your yecommendation the congress authorized $\$ 340$ minion for this great grogram over the next three years. zoww ever, only one halt of the $\$ 50$ million authomized was requested in your fiscal 1966 supplanemed submussion and Foz fiscal 196 g the recruest is for only $\$ 45$ million monewnat of the amount authorized by the congress. We cannot galvanize the medical and scinentific commuity into the alloout attack on these discames Which you have deranded unlese wo provice then with the funds necessary to set up these regional medical centex programs.

Mt. president, I subute this donmenterion in no getwt of caviling cothcism This bs m 26 th year in the concress and my 20 h year of service on the Rouse mpprophations subecmatetee
 Presinent in that length of time has exhbited more leadership than you in the quest for acelthier Anerica. Your comascionate
 divability and disease ts evident in the monumental health enacte ments which you proposed and guided through the ssch mad 89 th congrayses.

On a personal note, I am gratetul beyond measure for your
 colleagues in the congresc. have played in the buinaing of a healther and hapoter Raverca.

Rowever. ss F have listened to the distinguished coctove testifying before our conaitese over the past two months on the Liscal 1967 budget For the Rational pastitutes of Reathy I have becone more and more concerred that the propoeed budget will fall fas shott of meeting the imaediate challenges which you have oute Lined so eloguentiy in your three zealth Messuges and in the Exuy historic health Iegisiation which prowices the blueprint for an unprecedented war upon disease.

Deeply consident that we share comon aspixations in the heath ficld, I would very moch apprectiate an early opportunity to cone and talk to you about. these matters of mutual concern berore the committee on zppropriations makes itssreport to the bongress.
